## Women's team falls in CIAA opening round

After a lackluster performance in last year's CIAA Women's Tournament, second-year head coach Henry E. White hoped that his Falcons would improve its performance this year.

Instead, they fell again in the first round, losing to Virginia State 68-60 at the new Raleigh Entertainment and Sports Arena.

"Physically, I have a team of great competitors," White said before the tournament. "This team really gives their all when out on the court. However, mentally they could use some improvement. I would like to see them focus more out on the court."

White felt that since there had not been any one CIAA team dominating the season, the Falcons would have an opportunity to do better this year.

"The outcome of the tournament is like the weather," he said. "It is totally unpredictable."

half 32-25, lose six seniors: Jada Tabor, Anastacia Sands, Jacinda White, Kim Green, Stacy Thomas and Che'Landra Moore.

Sands, who is a three-time all-CIAA player, scored 15 points and pulled down 17 rebounds in the team's loss.

Junior forward Sheba Fullwood scored 20 points on 9 of 12 shooting and had six rebounds.

Assistant Coach Al Lunsford said the team members' closeness helped them maintain a bond on and off the court during the season.

"Each player of our team is represented by a bicycle spoke," he said. "And in order to make a wheel—or in our case, a team—they

all have to come together as one."

The team members created their own group —Hoop Phi Psi— to illustrate the closeness of the team.

Unfortunately, the team's practice sessions were cancelled earlier this year because of the January snowstorm. The team was forced to miss various practices and games. The games were rescheduled for the weeks prior to the tournament, which has decreased the amount of practice time the team has. Tabor said that the team usually practices two-to three and-a-half hours but because of their new game schedule it has been changed to about one-and-a-half hours.

"This whole practice thing can only have a positive effect on us because it will allow us to become mentally ready for the game," senior center Che'Landra Moore said. "Besides, during this time of the year your body receives extra energy from somewhere and your whole game elevates."

The Falcons finished the season 14-13.

"I bring baseball and basketball together," he says. "I couldn't play one without the

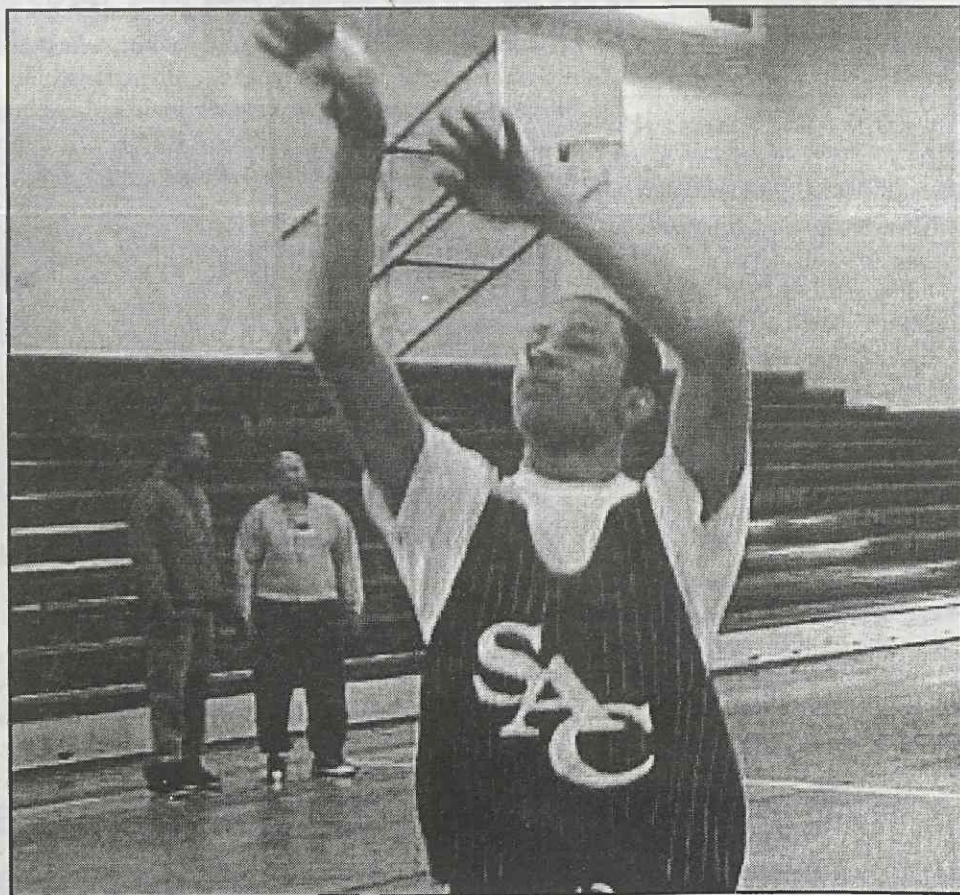
