The story reads in part:
"Mr. Finch came to Littleton in 1934, fresh from St. Augustine's College and a short period of graduate study at Columbia University. At Littleton he found five teachers teaching seven years of elementary school work in a four-room building. There were no transportation facilities. He has added three classrooms and five teachers, plus three years of high school work. There has also been an increase in enrollment amounting to over 150 pupils, making a total of 500. Adequate transportation facilities have been obtained, and all teachers hold A certificates."
