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SEMINAR STUDIES SOUTH

COMMUNITY COUNCIL PASSED

"Problems and Promise In a Changing South" was the title of the Human Relations Seminar at the University of North Carolina.

Vann Massey, Vice-President of the Student Government, and Betty Anderson, Editor of the newspaper, represented North Carolina Wesleyan at the seminar attended by fifty students from various colleges December 10 and 11.

Mr. Edward P. Morgan of A B C delivered the keynote address on Saturday afternoon which dealt with the problems in the South, particularly the "Four Gals With a Goal", as he called the four Negro girls in Louisiana.

Saturday night they attended a panel discussion on the legality vs. morality of the sit-in movements.

Dr. Warren Ashby, Professor of Philosophy at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina delivered the closing speech on the "Promise of the Changing South."

The seminar was cosponsored by the student government and the YM-YWCA of the University of North Carolina and the U. S. National Student Association.

Vann attended the workshop which dealt with the meaning of higher education in the new South. The role of the church in a changing South was the title of the workshop in which Betty participated.

The other workshops studied questions regarding the political responsibility in a changing South, the South's obligation in a changing world and the South's response to an economy in transition.

The student body of North Carolina Wesleyan College voted 67-2 in favor of a Community Council, Thursday, December 15.

The Community Council is a new program for governing the life of the college. The goal is to establish "Wesleyan Community through fidelity, service and integrity."

In The Assembly program Dr. C. Edwin Harwood, Professor of English, explained that the key word to the program is confidence and trust.

The Council has the power to counsel anyone or any group in the Wesleyan Community to promote a better relationship and efficiency in the Community. It has the power to investigate any area of the community life to obtain facts concerning various problems confronting the community. It may recommend to any person or group of persons in the Wesleyan community the findings, beliefs, or suggestions of the Community Council. It has no authority to enforce action on any part of the Community. This power is left in the hands of the Dean and the Administration.

The Community Council program does not list those things a student must do. It presents the students a Bill of Rights, which states:

"We, the people of North Carolina Wesleyan College Community do firmly intend:

- I. That every student of the Community shall receive equal and fair treatment in all academic matters.

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
