Plans Set For Inauguration Of President

Mrs. Sasser Will Appear In Concert


The first event in the 1961-62 Concert and Lecutre Series sponsored by North Carolina Wesleyan College will take place in the College Chapel on Friday evening, October 27, at 8:15 p. m.

Thelma P. Sasser, local pianist and wife of Dr. William Sasser of the Music Department at the College will be featured as soloist. The concert is free and the public is cordially invited to attend.

Mrs. Sasser, the former Thelma Paiewonsky, is a native of the Dominican Republic. All of her advanced study has been done in this country. She holds degrees from the University of Jacksonville, Fla. and from Oberlin College in Ohio. Her teachers have included John MacEnulty in Florida and Emil Danenberg at Oberlin.

She has been featured soloist in programs of the Southeast Composers' League and has appeared as guest soloist with the Jacksonville Philharmonic Orchestra. She has concertized widely in this state, both as soloist and in duo-piano recitals with her husband.

The program will include Bach's French Overture, the Variations in C Minor by Beethoven, and three works by the French composer, Gabriel Faure. The second portion of Mrs. Sasser's recital will feature Paul Hindemith's Second Sonata for piano and the "Four Spanish Pieces" of Manuel de Falla.

Program Scheduled To Begin At 3 P. M.

Plans for the installation of Thomas Asa Collins as the first President of Wesleyan College on October 25 have been completed, according to Dr. Jack W. Moore, chairman of the Inaugural Committee.

The public has been invited to attend the inauguration ceremony which will start with the formation of the Academic Procession at the Gravelly Science building. The inauguration will begin at 3:00 p. m. on the campus in front of the Braswell Administration Building.

Delegates from colleges, universities, learned societies, boards, educational and professional organizations will register at 11 a. m. at the Main Lounge of the Student Union Building with a luncheon for delegates and guests at noon in the same building. An open house of the buildings for the delegates and guests of the College will start at 1:00 p. m.

After the inauguration ceremonies, the President's Reception will be held at the newly completed President's Home on campus.

The Academic Procession will consist of the following:

The College Marshall, Dr. Willard B. Gatewood; delegates from colleges and universities; delegates from learned societies, boards; Faculty of Wesleyan College; Trustees of Wesleyan; members of the Rocky Mount Area Wesleyan College Foundation; and The Inaugural Party.

Mr. Luther W. Hill of Tarboro, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, will preside.

Dr. Robert E. Cushman, Dean, Duke Divinity School of Duke University, will give the Invocation.

Dr. Jack W. Moore, Academic Dean of Wesleyan College, will present Dr. William C. Archie, Director of the Board of Higher Education of the state of North Carolina. Dr. Archie will give the Inaugural address. His topic will be "The Idea of a Christian College."

The anthem, "O Be Joyful" will be sung by the Wesleyan Singers under the direction of Dr. William Sasser, Director.

The charge to President Collins will be given by Paul N. Garber, Resident Bishop, Richmond area, The Methodist Church. After President Collins is inaugurated, Bishop Garber will offer the prayer of consecration. President Collins will then give his response.

Immediately following the Re-cessional, Bishop Garber will give the benediction.

Community's Conscience

The Community Council is the conscience of the community to encourage and stimulate the com-

munity toward the enactment of the Bill of Rights which is a positive statement of the rights of everyone. It puts the emphasis on the belief that everyone is basically honest and that the majority will lead the minority of dishonest.

Another definition of the Community Council is the idea of the Community Council being used as a cementing or uniting force between the different groups or areas of the community—faculty, staff, and students.

The Community Council is the body to which any member of the community may appeal to have a matter or issue investigated to restore harmony between two different areas of the community. An example is a student may recommend the investigation of an incident concerning a faculty or staff member or vice versa.

The power of the Community Council is to recommend to any group about any subject or in any area where there seems to be a problem to which attention needs to be called. The Community Council
