New Social Probation Regulations Accepted

then be expelled from school as was the original ruling. For a second offense, the student will be suspended from school for at least one semester and a notation will be made in his permanent record.

According to Robert Stephens. S.G.A. president, the old regulation of expelling a student for drinking on campus was unrealistic. The penalties for this offense were so stringent that students were very hesitant about reporting infractions of the rule. With the new rule, students should be more willing to report infractions, knowing that a first violation will not result in expulsion from school.

The new regulations concerning the possession or use of alcoholic beverages on the campus are as follows:

> The guilty student will be placed on Social Probation beginning the instant of pronouncement of sentence, to last for a period of not less than ten weeks for proven consumption anywhere on campus and possession in the dormitories, or for a period of not less than five weeks for possession outside the dormitories, while college is in session and the student is enrolled. not counting official vacation periods. The S.L.A. will establish a specific termination date of the Social Probation period as part of the sentence. The following condition will be in force as part of the Social Probation:
