

Library Gets **Memorial Fund**

A memorial fund has been established at N. C. Wesleyan College to honor the memory of Dr. H. O. Pearson, a long-time and beloved practicing physician of Pinetops, N. C.

The hometown friends of the late Dr. Pearson, donated \$600 to establish the fund. It will be used to subscribe to a 15-volume "Encyclopedia of World Art," 10 volumes of which have already been published. The remaining volumes will be purchased by the fund and placed in the Wesleyan library as they are published.

Dr. Pearson was a native of Wilson County and practiced in Pinetops for more than 30 years.

The committee, working with Wesleyan Librarian Walter Gray, selected the art encyclopedia as a fitting memorial to Dr. Pearson, McGraw-Hill in its 75-year history.

The company further claims for it: "A cultural project that has not counterpart. Never before have all the visual arts of all times and places been presented within a single, comprehensive art library. World-renowned historians and art critics . . . carators and archeologists . .. specialists in fine art photography and master printers from 35 nations are contributing to the realization of this project.

Dr. Thomas A. Collins, president, joined with Librarian Gray in expressing to the memorial committee the college's appreciation for the substantial gift. Wesleyan's library now has over 25,000 volumes. It is being added to at the rate of 4,000 carefully selected volumes a year. Plans re progressing for the construc-

Wesleyan continued to make all possible progress toward regional accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, according to Dr. Thomas A. Collins, who has just returned from the annual meeting of the association in Richmond.

Wesleyan's Candidate for Membership status in the association was continued by vote of the association. The college's selfstudy report was accepted and the association will send an examining committee to Weslevan next spring. The committee will report at next year's annual meeting when Weslevan will first become eligible for full membership following the graduation of its third class on June 2, 1966.

N. C. Wesleyan was the first North Carolina college to be granted the Candidate for Membership status by the association, a category established in 1963 to cover new colleges. The college has been guided in its progress toward regional accreditation by two previous as-

sociation committee visits. The self-study was made by the faculty throughout last year under the chairmanship of Dr. Peter Gerschefski, who edited the report.

Wesleyan is an accredited member of the North Carolina College Conference and the Senate of the Methodist Church. Regional accreditation will assure exchange of credits from Wesleyan to any college in the United States.
