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SUMMER SABBATICALS GRANTED

Summer sabbaticals have been granted to three members of the faculty for the summer of 1968.

Dr. Collins announced that Drs. Raymond E. Bauer, John W. Kilgore and Jack E. Teagarden have been granted the sabbaticals for travel, research and study in their respective teaching fields.

Dr. Bauer, associate professor of education, will engage in a seminar and field trip entitled "Contrasts in Culture and Life Under Communism," which is being sponsored by several national education societies in cooperation with Kent State University. Included in the plans are travel and study in Germany, Czechoslovakia, Hungary and Russia.

Dr. Kilgore, chairman of the department of chemistry and physics, will spend the sum-mer on the Wesleyan and Duke University campuses doing research in the chemistry laboratories. He will work closely with Dr. Pelham Wilder, Jr., his graduate research director at Duke, in an attempt to or

So all in all, this year looks like it will be the best in Wesleyan's wrestling history. With a second place position in the DIAC last year, there's not but one way the team can go - Number 1.

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

Coach Music will be the assistant Coach and work with the team also.


