The Chinese Wall

The N. C. Wesleyan College Theater presented its annual Spring Production, "The Chinese Wall," Thursday through Saturday evenings, May 9-11.

"The Chinese Wall," a modern farce by Swiss playwright Max Frisch, centers on the efforts of a young man to dam up history. The play brings together notable historical figures, including Pontius Pilate, Christopher Columbus, Napoleon and many others, in a way that is highly amusing, often surprising.

Anthony Dingman, director of the WCT, directed a cast of 40 students and faculty members in the production which marked the initial presentation of the play in North Carolina.

One of the most complicated productions presented in Rocky Mount, the staging of "The Chinese Wall" involved an intricate mixing of media, including both live and taped music, films and slides and characters both living and dead.

A new seating-stage arrangement was in use for the production. The gym was converted into a theater, using both the bleachers and raised tier seating around a proscenium-type stage erected in the center of the floor, assuring good audience view of the stage.

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
