stairs classrooms. In any case, the new restrictive measures are not designed to end a problem by ignoring it, but are designed for the benefit of all students as well as those which cannot be accepted at this time. As Mr. Garlow stated, "The new precedent has been set because of the physical restrictions of both the college and of many wheelchair students."

Dean Moore is in agreement with Mr. Garlow's recommendation. He also believes that if this precedent is maintained that the Board of Trustees will become more aware of the acuteness of the problem and will endeavor to give support to the building of an elevator.

The building funds for the elevator have already been partially raised by the S.A.A.B., Students Against Architectural Barriers. About \$5,000 has been raised; about \$1,000 more is needed to fulfill the S.A.A.B. portion. It is hoped that the college will raise its portion, \$12,000 in time for the elevator to be constructed this summer.

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
