Major SGA Elections Set For October 30

Elections for Dorm Council, the Senate, Primary Court and the Freshman Class will be held October 30.

The Dorm Council nominations will begin this Tuesday, September 28, then elections will be held Thursday, September 30 in the dorms. A president and two dorm council members will be elected. There will be two council members elected for each floor. The Dorm Council is responsible for making sure excessive noise does not occur, litter and unsanitary conditions are taken care of, infraction of dormitory rules, rowdiness and misconduct is brought under control.

The Senate is also electing members. Applications were due Thursday, September 23 for dorm and day students planning to run. Three Senators from each dorm will be elected, and two day students from the first one hundred and twenty-five students and one for each sixty-five thereafter. The Senate establishes committees to investigate matters of concern to the student body. Some committees are permanent, such as: the Constitution Committee, the Food Services Committee, the Grievance Committee, the Senate Rules Committee, the Finance Commission, and the School Spirit Committee.

The Primary Court will elect five students on the 28th of September. One student will be elected from each dorm and one day student elected. The Primary Court will take care of minor infractions not covered by the Dorm Council, hear cases involving occupants of more than one dorm, assist in the formation of dorm policy if need be and hear cases where penalties imposed by Dorm Councils have been violated,

The Freshman Class will also be electing officers. A president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. Applications for these offices are due October first and the elections will be held the fifteenth of October. Speeches may be given by the candidates the Tuesday before election is held.

The newest member of our college staff is Dr. Joseph Mac-Pherson, newly appointed college librarian, Dr. MacPherson comes to Wesleyan from George Peabody College. where he spent last year working towards completion of his masters' degree in library science. He holds a Ph.D. in History from Vanderbilt and has taught history for ten years. He also has a B.S. in business from George Peabody. In remarking on his new position, Dr. MacPherson states that his chief concern is to get more use of the library by the students and by the faculty. Along these lines he is interested in contact with students and says further that "sources need to be marketed."
