

Wesleyan Students Attend Journalism Seminar in Florida By: Phillip Jones

On Wednesday, October 30, two students and one faculty adviser from <u>The Decree</u> set out for Orlando, Florida, for a four-day journalism convention. The American Collegiate Press (ACP) and College Media Advisors (CMA) run this annual event.

<u>The Decree</u>, <u>The Dissenter</u>, and the Professional Development Committee paid for our venture through a joint effort.
