
FROM THE Editors Desk

Tillman was living his dream in the Arizona Republican, Senator John NFL. After graduating from Arizona State University with a 3.84 GPA, a



Arizona Cardinals Head Coach Dave MacGinnis said Tillman was "very serious" about his decision, "It's very personal, and I honor that. I honor the integrity of that. It was not a snap decision he woke up and made yesterday."
