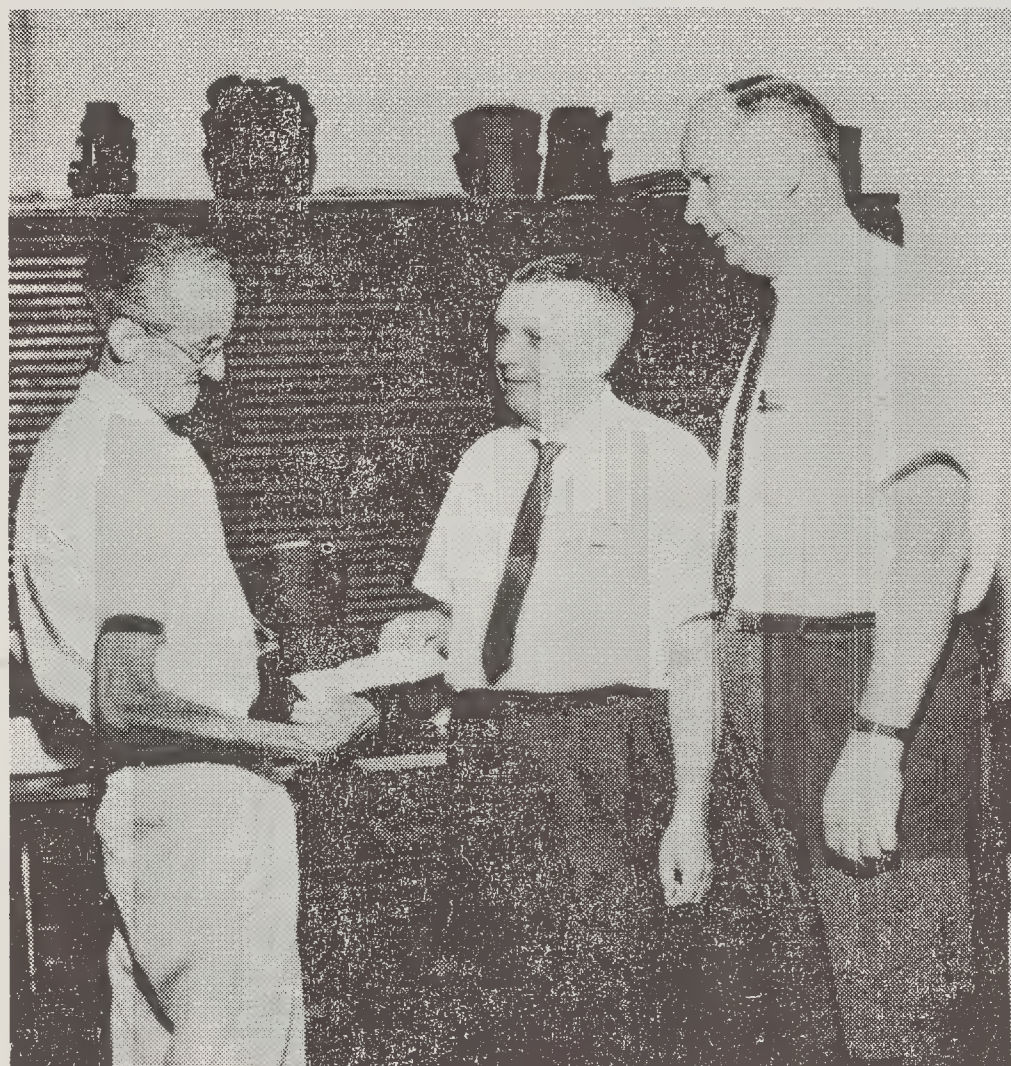


EMPLOYEES RETIRE AT KERNERSVILLE

Dean was first employed with Adams-Millis in 1918. He learned to knit and was later promoted to fixing. In 1927, he left for other employment, but returned to Plant #4 in July of 1930 as a night watchman. A year later, Dean was transferred to fixing where he remained until retirement.
