Plant Four

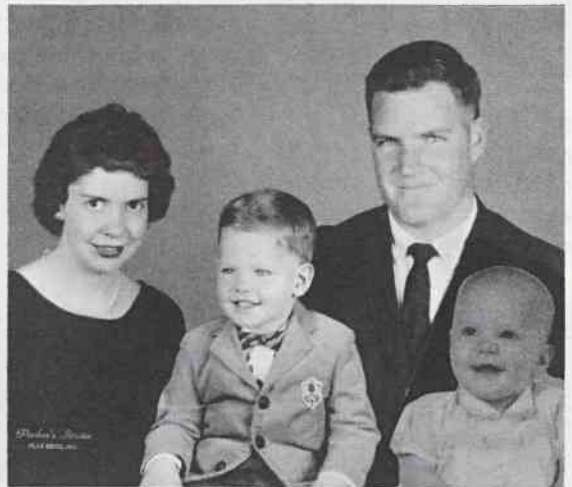
