

MRS. J. H. ADAMS SUCCUMBS TO LENGTHY ILLNESS

Mrs. J. H. Adams, widow of J. H. Adams who was one of the founders of Adams-Millis Corporation, died on October 6, 1966, after a lengthy illness.

She had been closely identified with the life of High Point for two-thirds of a century since she came here from Bennettsville, S. C., and married the then young hosiery manufacturer who was to take a leading role in the development of Adams-Millis Corporation, which he headed until his death in 1935. Following the death of her husband, Mrs. Adams was named a director of Adams-Millis Corporation, a position she held for twenty years, retiring in 1955.

A woman who preferred to live quietly, Mrs. Adams, until health incapacitated her, maintained a lively interest in civic affairs of High Point, being a generous contributor to numerous causes.

The Adams lived on English Road, at the corner of English and Pine, until they built and moved to their North Main Street residence. This home was given to the Y.W.C.A. when the Adams moved into their Sedgefield residence which they built nearly forty years ago.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Nathan Ayers and Mrs. Allen Watkins, both of Sedgefield.
