

The letter below was received recently by Personnel Director J. W. Snotherly. Miss Pawlick and her sister, stockholders of Adams-Millis for many years, attended the stockholders meeting and the dedication program at the J. Ed Millis Plant in Kernersville last year. Miss Pawlick was with the investment firm that handled the sale of Adams-Millis stock when it was first listed on the New York Stock Exchange in 1928, and she wrote the original certificate on which the stock was sold.
