OKLAHOMA PLANT DEDICATED

Adams-Millis Corporation formally dedicated its new manufacturing and warehousing facility in Edmond, Oklahoma, on July 25. Emily Millis, daughter of Corporate President J. H. Millis, officially opened the plant with the cutting of the red ribbon. Company officials on hand for the ceremonies included President James H. Millis, Hosiery Division President Donald G. Lindner, and Vice President Charles P. Wirsching. Welcoming Adams-Millis and its officials to Edmond was Mayor Fred P. Snyder who pledged full support of the city for future projects.

Following the cutting of the ribbon, company officials conducted tours of the plant and explained the manufacturing processes to those attending the open house.

The Edmond plant, started in 1968, has a total of 40,000 square feet of manufacturing and warehousing space, and was constructed principally for the manufacture of ladies' panty hose.

Originally, it was designed as a finishing, shipping and warehousing facility to employ approximately 100 people, and with plans for expansion over the next few years. The demand for hosiery has already forced a step-up in the construction schedule; and, with the addition of seaming and knitting departments, the plant has been enlarged twice since it was built last year.

Charles Tuttle, who was with the ladies' hosiery division in High Point for thirty-one years, moved to Edmond to act as general superintendent of the new plant.
