
Quality control is always of great importance at Adams-Millis. Gladys Rogers, of the Knitting Department, and Helen Sanders, of the Seaming Department, help keep the quality of all Plant #1 goods at a high level by running constant checks on production through tests and inspections of random samples of each of the knitters' and seamers' lots. They work with the operators to locate and eliminate any problems they find so that all of the plant's production will be as consistently high in quality as possible.
