When Amelia Williams first sought a job there were not many of them around. She was 16 years old and it was 1933 in the height of America's Great Depression.

'I've enjoyed working bere," said Williams. "I believe in working, not standing around talking.

She has seen a multitude of changes during her years with Adams-Millis -- both style and technological -- and admits it has been frustrating at times.

"Getting a new style to work "I was lucky to get a job right wasn't always easy," she said.

> But perseverance was a strong point with her and Williams said she wouldn't change anything in her career if she had it to do over again. She still operates about 40 knitting machines during her shift at Drexel.

Williams has no idea about how many dozens of socks she hasknitted during her 60 years with the company but the number would be enormous.
