nity and are causing deterioration of a significant segment of our young people.

Much like drug usage, Stanback says that campus violence needs to be curved and that guns are too readily available.

" Campus violence and student deaths are no doubt unfortunate, but life on campus is an extension of life in our communities," said Stanback. "Community involvement is necessary in order to control crime in our city and involvement of the college community is necessary to curve crime on campuses. Law enforcement can not do it alone".

Stanback also commented on education in today's society and expressed that serious students will usually excel, others will eventually be weeded out and those who genuinely want to learn will learn.




