medical center was first planned, many asked where Duke would get enough patients to justify such a large institution. However, within a few years after the Hospital's doors were opened in 1930, the need for expansion already was apparent.

With appropriations from the Duke Endowment and Duke University, a wing for private and semi-private patients and also offices and examining rooms for the Private Diagnostic Clinics was completed in 1940.

By 1952, the out-patient clinic had handled more than a million and a half visits, and more than 450,000 patients from all 48 states and more than 40 foreign countries had been admitted to the Hospital as bed patients.

In addition to constant changes in the Hospital and Medical School building to meet the ever-increasing demand for medical services, a separate structure, the William B. Bell Research Building, was erected.
