Foreign Students in Administration

At the request of the International Health Division, United States Public Health Service, Mr. F. Ross Porter, Superintendent of Duke Hospital, accepted six foreign students for a special program of training in hospital administrative techniques based on accepted U. S. standards. After two years in the Far East as consultant in hospital affairs, Mr. Porter was well-suited to supervise such a program.

With the Philippines, Formosa, Honduras and Korea represented, the group offers a wide range in training and experiences. At least two, "Jesse" Ceballos and "Arch" Su, have succumbed to the American habit of nicknames, and Mr. Falope's

"Theodoro" has been shortened to "Ted." Let us give you a "capsule" introduction to these six gentlemen.

Dr. Jesus B. Ceballos of the Philippines holds degrees from the University of Santo Carlos, Cebu, and the University of Santo Tomas in Manila. He saw service in both the Philippine Army and the Army of the United States. He is the father of five children. Aside from his professional duties as Acting-Director of Bohol Provincial Hospital, Bohol, P. I., Dr. Ceballos participates actively in various Philippine medical and eivic organizations.

Dr. Tzung-Liang Su of Formosa is Superintendent-Medical Director of Taiwan Provincial Tainan T. B. Control Center in Tainan, Formosa, and in addition to his tuberculosis control work must superintend a two hundred bed sanatorium. Dr. Su received his medical degree from Taihoku Imperial University (under Japanese rule the name given to the National Taiwan University Medical School). Dr. Su's primary interest since graduation from medical school has been in the field of tuberculosis. Like Dr. Ceballos, Dr. Su does his part for various medical and civic groups.

Back in the western hemisphere, Mr. Thelmo T. Falope comes to Duke from Tegucigalpa, Honduras. Employed by the Servicio Cooperative Interamericano de Salud Publica (an instrument of the health arm of the country rather heavily underwritten by the U. S. Point Four Program), Mr. Falope's interest in the hospital field stems from a tour of duty at the Sanatorio Nacional para Tuberculosos, a tuberculosis sanatorium. Mr. Falope was graduated from the In-
