Rehabilitation Service Open

Duke University Medical School and Hospital has initiated a Rehabilitation Service for teaching and for expanding the hospital's service to patients, Dean W. C. Davison has announced.

During the first year the teaching phase of the service will be conducted under provisions of a \$15,000 grant from the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation, Washington, D. C. It is anticipated that the grant will be renewed and augmented after the first year for a period of five years, giving a total local grant of \$115,000. In addition to training medical students at the University, the program will benefit key staff personnel as well as students in nursing, hospital administration, social service, psychology, and physical and occupational therapy.

Dr. William D. deGravelles has been appointed director of the new Rehabilitation Service program. Dr. deGravelles is a native of Louisiana
