objective about each problem as it arises and has never held grudges against department chairmen who oppose him."

Another medical staff member suggests that Dean Davison's success as an administrator lies partly in his exceptional skill in delegating responsibility. He doesn't hesitate to entrust important duties to his staff members—after having carefully selected the right person for a particular job—and he would rather have that person make a wrong decision than make no decision at all.

"A New American Colt"

Dean Davison was born in Grand Rapids, Mich., in 1892, the son of a Methodist minister. He received the A.B. degree from Princeton in 1913, followed by study at Oxford University, England, as a Rhodes Scholar.

Dean Davison received the B.A. and B.Sc. degrees from Oxford and later the M.D. from Johns Hopkins. In 1917 he was married to Atala Thayer Scudder of Glen Head, Long Island, to whom he had been engaged while she was at Bryn Mawr and he was at Princeton. Mrs. Davison, like her husband, is an M.D. and a pediatrician. The Davison's have three children, two of whom are physicians.
