Sanders to Argentina

A Fulbright grant to support a year's lectureship in Argentina has been awarded to Aaron P. Sanders, director of the Duke University Medi-

cal Center's radioisotope laboratory.

Sanders will visit the Institute of Physics, National University of Cuyo in San Carlos de Bariloche, Argentina, as lecturer in health physics during the 1958-59 academic year. Health physics is concerned with safety procedures for persons whose work involves radiation.

Accompanied by his wife and children, Sanders will leave for South America next August. He will resume his post at Duke the following summer.

Sanders, an assistant professor of radiology in the Duke University Medical School, joined the University faculty in 1953. Earlier, he was radiological safety officer at North Carolina State College and associate health physicist at the Brookhaven National Laboratory, Upton, Long Island, N. Y. A native of Phoenix, Arizona, he holds degrees from Texas Western College and the University of Rochester.
