Duke and its Physical Therapy Department are hard at work on the problems of our growing number of older citizens. Miss Lois Perkins is working with the Center for the Study of Aging on the problem of retaining and improving the gait of the older person. This is a challenging area, indeed, since the kind of exercises that aging joints can tolerate must be worked out.

The swimming pool—popularly thought of as a standard piece of physical therapy equipment—is used primarily in work with severely paralyzed patients for whom exercise is extremely difficult. The buoyancy of the water lightens the amount of work the muscles must do to try to carry out rehabilitating exercises.

In other areas, too, Duke's physical therapists are busy. Miss Beth Ussher works closely with the Department of Surgery; Miss Eleanor Flanagan with the Departments of Medicine and Neurology; and a therapist also plays an active role in the physical therapy management of medical problems in the Out-Patient Department.

Our Physical Therapy Department, like its sister departments, is not only busy treating patients but also teaching students. Duke is proud to be one of three schools in the country offering post-baccalaureate work leading to a Master's degree in physical therapy. Duke's students for this course are carefully chosen, coming to Duke with an impressive background in the biological and physical sciences. To this training is added intensive work in anatomy and physiology plus sufficient work in psychology to learn to evaluate properly themselves and their patients.

Top this high calibre background with the course of training in physical therapy techniques under the guidance of Miss Kaiser and her fine staff, and you can see that Duke's Department of Physical Therapy is one for all of us to be proud of.
