Made of hard rubber in the shape of an "S," the air-way is inserted in the victim's mouth and the rescuer breathes into the other end. These air-ways come in adult and children's sizes and are handy gadgets for the family first aid kit, Dr. Stephen added. At the close of the meeting Mrs. A. N.
