Auxiliary Votes \$10,000 to Chapel Fund

On March 15 the Board of the Duke Hospital Women's Auxiliary voted to donate \$10,000 to the fund for a Hospital Chapel. This is in addition to the \$15,000 contributed in the spring of 1959, and brings the Auxiliary's total gift to \$25,000.
