## people on the move

### Attend Congress

Nineteen members of the Duke Department of Surgery participated in the Fifty-Fourth Annual Clinical Congress of the American College of Surgeons Oct. 14-18 in Atlantic City.

Dr. William G. Anlyan, dean of the School of Medicine, presented a talk on the new curriculum at Duke.

Dr. David C. Sabiston, Jr., chairman of the Department of Surgery, served as moderator of two panel discussions, one on surgical aspects of coronary artery disease and one on coronary and thoracic aneurysm surgery.

Glenn, professor and chief of urology; Dr. Kenneth L. Pickrell, professor and chief of plastic and maxillofacial surgery; Dr. Raymond W. Postlethwait, professor of surgery and chief of staff at the V. A. Hospital; Dr. William W. Shingleton, professor of surgery and chief of general surgery; Dr. H. F. Siegler, assistant professor of surgery; Dr. Donald Silver, associate professor of surgery; Dr. Saul Boyarsky, professor of urology and director of urologic research, and Dr. Paul Ebert, associate professor of surgery.

A number of other Duke personnel attended the congress but did not present a paper or talk.



### Eisdorfer Selected

Dr. Carl Eisdorfer, professor of medical psychology and professor of psychiatry, has been named chairman-elect of the Division of Maturity and Old Age of the American Psychological Association.

Present projects for Dr. Eisdorfer's division include planning for the forthcoming White House Conference on Aging and organizing an APA-wide task force to study the current scientific and professional status of the psychology of aging.

### Gives Paper

Dr. James F. Glenn, chief of urology, participated in a paper entitled "Intersex Problems" at the meeting of the American College of Surgeons in Atlantic City Oct. 15.

Dr. Glenn also attended the annual meeting of the Society of Pelvic Surgeons in Cleveland Oct. 22-25. He discussed "Urinary Diversion by the Gersuny Technique" and presented a movie on the subject.

### Present Reports

Five doctors in the Department of Orthopaedics presented reports of research at the recent meeting of the American Medical Association.

Dr. Ralph Coonrad presented a paper concerned with the nonoperative management of intervertebral discs syndromes. Dr. Edmond Dyas, senior assistant resident in orthopaedics, was co-author and gave the paper.

Dr. Clinton Lincoln, Dr. Frank H. Bassett and Dr. J. Leonard Goldner presented an exhibit dealing with compression of the posterior tibial nerve at the convention.

Dr. Frank H. Bassett and Dr. William Ogden attended the Congress of Neurological Surgeons in Toronto, Canada, to

present an exhibit. Dr. Bassett also visited research laboratories at the Hospital for Sick Children in Toronto.

### Sabiston at Symposium

Dr. David C. Sabiston, Jr., chairman of the Department of Surgery, presented introductory remarks at the Twentieth Annual Medical and Surgical Symposium of the Raleigh Academy of Medicine earlier this month. The conference was entitled "Surgical Management of Vascular Disease."
