13 Appointments, Promotions Announced


Ten promotions and three new appointments to the medical center staff were announced by former University Provost R. Taylor Cole last month.

Gardner Lecture Given Jan. 30

A man whose association with the University of Minnesota as a student, teacher, and physician spans more than a half-century delivered the fourth annual Clarence E. Gardner lecture at the medical center Jan. 30.

Dr. Owen H. Wangensteen, professor emeritus of surgery and Regents Professor of Surgery at Minnesota, spoke on "The Historical Aspects of the Evolution of the Management of Acute Intestinal Obstruction." The lecture was also part of the Dean's Hour series.

The Gardner Lecture is named for Dr. Clarence E. Gardner, professor emeritus of surgery and former chairman of the department at Duke.

Dr. Hall, who received both his undergraduate and M. D. degrees from Duke, was first appointed to the staff here in 1958. He has previously worked with the National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Blindness.
