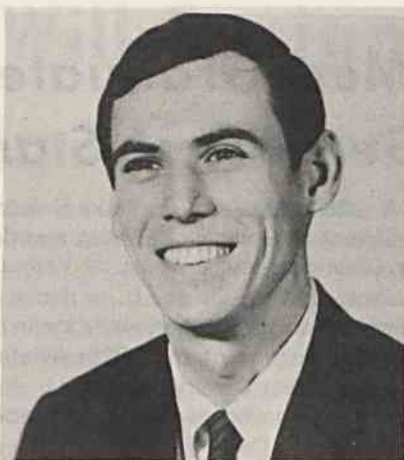

Clarence H. Cobb, business manager of the Medical Private Diagnostic Clinic for the past 31 years, has been promoted to the post of director of M.P.D.C.

Mr. Cobb will assume administrative responsibility for the operation of the private clinic and oversee all its activities.

A 1938 graduate of the Duke Program in Hospital Administration, Mr. Cobb has been at Duke since 1933. He earned his undergraduate degree at the University of North Carolina the same year. He is a member of the Medical Group Management Association and a fellow in the American College of Clinic Managers.

Promoted to business manager of the clinic was Ralph Hawkins, formerly assistant business manager. Mr. Hawkins will take charge of general operations of the clinic. New assistant business manager replacing George Whiteside III who recently accepted a position with Marquette University Medical Center is Patrick Lavern Powell. Mr. Powell earned his B. He will aid in long-range planning of the clinic and serve as a liaison between the private practice of medicine and other Department of Medicine affairs.

Davison Member Dies

A charter member of the Medical Center's Davison Club died in Durham in early August.

Dr. Hunter M. Sweaney, a practicing physician in the city for many years, was 75 at the time of his death.

In the spring of 1968, Dr. Sweaney and his daughters endowed a continuing annual lectureship in surgery to be shared by Duke and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Known as the "Dr. Hunter Sweaney Visiting Lectureship in Surgery," the program is designed to bring renowned surgeons from all parts of the world to the two campuses to share their knowledge and experience with students of medicine, particularly those specializing in surgery.

Dr. Sweaney was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania School of Medicine.
