Given Research Grant

The grant will enable Dr. Wolbarsht, in collaboration with Dr. P. P. Lele of the Department of Experimental Medicine at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, to investigate whether ultrasonics can be used to disrupt retino-vitreous adhesions that often form in adults. Such adhesions frequently cause retinal detachment and blindness.

The grant is effective for one year.
