Thomas Reamer Named Honorary Duke Alumnus

I. Thomas Reamer, director of pharmacy services at the hospital for almost 40 years, has been elected an honorary member of the Duke School of Medicine Alumni Association.

Mr. Reamer, who will retire June 30, was presented with the alumni certificate "in recognition of his outstanding and dedicated service to generations of Duke medical students and staff."

The award came at the Duke alumni dinner during the North Carolina Medical Association meeting May 18 in Pinehurst.

Mr. Reamer is only the second non-physician elected to honorary membership in the association. The first was the Rev. James T. Cleland, dean of the Duke Chapel.

Dr. Jay M. Arena, professor of pediatrics and secretary-treasurer of the Alumni Association, praised Mr. Reamer's' knowledge of drugs and their efficient use and his cordiality in sharing his information with Duke alumni day or night.

Mr. Reamer, a graduate of the University of Maryland School of Pharmacy, was named North Carolina.

Pharmacist of the Year in 1967. He is a charter member and past president of the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists and in 1959 received the Michigan chapter's H.A.K. Whitney Award.

Before coming to Duke in 1931, Mr. Reamer was assistant chief pharmacist at Johns Hopkins Hospital in Baltimore.

Dr. Ruffin Honored
