Duke Gets Grant

The John A. Hartford Foundation, Inc., of New York has made an award of \$170,313 to the Medical Center for a three-year study of macular degeneration, a little-understood blinding condition.

Announcement of the grant was made jointly by Harry B. George, foundation president, and Dr. William G. Anlyan, vice-president for health affairs at Duke.

Duke researchers believe that macular degeneration-traditionally thought to be hereditary-may instead be caused by metabolic disturbances. They will try to identify these metabolic defects and determine if they can be corrected by diet or drugs.

The research project will involve both the departments of ophthalmology and pediatrics.
