Anlyan Speaks In Netherlands

Dr. William G. Anlyan has been in The Hague, the Netherlands, this week as a participant in an international conference sponsored by the Josiah Macy, Jr. Foundation on "National Health Services: Their Impact on Medical Education and Their Role in Prevention."

Dr. Anlyan, vice president for health affairs, addressed the conference Wednesday, speaking on "Current Curricular Changes in the Continuum of Medical Education."

Other speakers in the Monday-Thursday conference were from Great Britain, Israel, Norway, Yugoslavia, New Zealand, Sweden, the People's Republic of China, Denmark and Spain, as well as the United States.

Enroute to The Hague, Dr. Anlyan stopped in London for discussions on the impact of national health insurance there on medical schools. Following The Hague conference, he traveled to Stockholm, Sweden, for discussions there today on effects of changes in the health-care system on health education.
