Professor Schafer Comes to Duke



Professor Werner Schäfer, director of the Max Planck Institute für Virusforschung in Tübingen, Germany, came to Duke on June 27 to spend three weeks in Dr. Joseph W. Beard's laboratory in the Department of Surgery.

The purpose of his visit is to initiate a collaborative program to study, in detail, the properties of several mammalian tumor virus antigens, including those from two possible human tumor virus candidates. Working with Dr. Schafer are Dr. Dani P. Bolognesi, assistant professor of surgery, and his colleagues, Drs. Robert Green, research associate in biochemistry, and Don Mickey, post-doctoral fellow in microbiology and immunology.

Dr. Schafer, an internationally known scientist who has made outstanding contributions in the area of animal virology, has of late concentrated his efforts on the study of immunological properties of RNA tumor viruses.

Accompanying Dr. Schafer are his wife Emma and two research assistants Liselotte Pister and Eveline Seifert.
