## Houpt named division head in psychiatry dept.

Dr. Jeffrey Houpt, associate professor of psychiatry, has been appointed head of the Division of Psychosomatic Medicine.

The appointment was announced by Dr. H. Keith H. Brodie, professor and chairman of the Department of Psychiatry. Brodie said Houpt is succeeding Dr. Marianne S. Breslin, who has been appointed chief of the psychotherapy section in the same division.

Houpt joined the Duke faculty as an associate professor in 1975. He earned a B.S. degree in 1963 from Wheaton College and was awarded an M.D. degree by the Baylor College of Medicine in

Following a medical internship at Boston City Hospital, 1967-68, he completed a residency in psychiatry at the Yale University School of Medicine, 1968-71.

Houpt served as a staff medical officer for the Oak Knoll Naval Hospital in Oakland, Calif., 1971-73, and was an adjunct assistant professor in the Pacific Medical Center, San Francisco, from 1973-75.
