SCC Is Closing Education Gap

Service clubs in West Columbus were told that Southeastern Community College's Continuing Adult Education Program may help close the adult education gap that exists today. Clifton A. McClelland, Director of the College's Extension Program, presented the College's Adult Extension Program to the Fair Bluff and Chadbourn Rotary clubs and Chadbourn Civitan club.

rows jobs. The College's Continuing Education Program offers courses which will help close the educational gap. School drop outs and other adults may now continue their education in the College's new night program.

The adult classes to be offered by the College at the Adult Extension Center, West Columbus High School, were given. These include basic adult classes, mathematics, reading improvement and grammar offered for the high school drop outs. In the occupational area are bookkeeping, typing and business English. Parent and family life course in sewing, modern math and personal income tax are to be offered.

The difficulties in recruiting adults for the classes in reading and writing were discussed. The

that 21.4% of the adults in Columbus County have less than 5 years schooling. About 54 per cent of the adults in this group of 4,800 are white--the other 46 per cent

are non-white. The College has given special emphasis to adult basic courses offering over 36% of its' adult classes in reading and writing.

McClelland asked the clubs to support Southeastern's Continuing Education Program as it offers the adults in the community a second chance to complete their high school education, an opportunity to learn to read

and write, a program to prepare for new and better jobs, and more enjoyable and more economical family life. He forecast

that if the program were successful it would not only increase the income of many adults but would also help reduce welfare costs.
