SDS loses suit

SDS Loses Suit. A federal judge in Hartford has denied the right of "official campus recognition" to a Students for a Democratic Society group at Central Connecticut State College. The ruling, the first of its kind by a federal court, could affect the offical status of other SDS groups on campuses. Judge T. Emmet Clarie said testimony by students did not convince him the group would be peaceful and would conform to college requirements for an approved organization.

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
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
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Do you think people should kill animals only for their skins, trophies, or for ornamentation?


