Ram Run Down

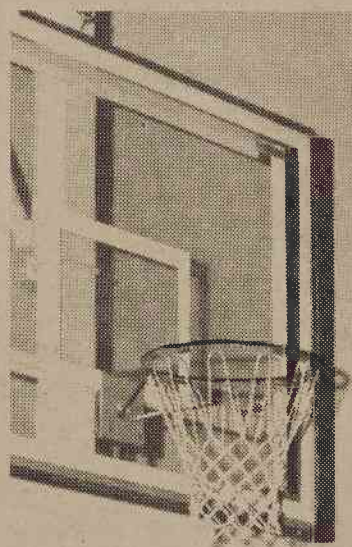

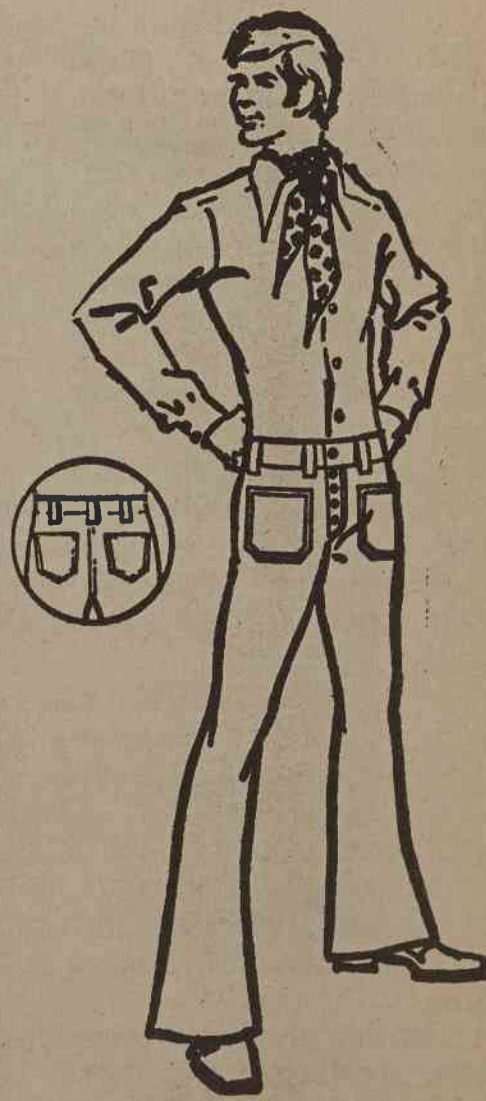
SCC Tops Cross-Country Meet
