## IN THE PHILOLOGIAN HALL FRI DAY EVENING.

The program was well prepared and rendered with interest ant enthusiasm. There were some excellent original papers on some of the live subjects of the
day, some bubbling with wit and humor. A number of good orations were delivered, which showed that our boys are at work in earnest. Mr. R. A. Atkins won the laurels in oratory for the evening.

The debate was a heated discussion tirronghout. The dehaters seemed to get into the spirit from the first and each one entered into the discussion with zeal and rim. The question was, "Resolved that denominational colleges offer better adrantages than state institutions. The affirmative maintained that in the smaller colleges students came into more direct contact with the professor than in the larger state institutions, and not only did they get nearer the professor, but that there was a Letter social spirit amoner the students. It was also shown that in the larger institutions much of the worl in the lower classes was done by the upler classmen who served as tutors an! were not qualified to give as good instructions as the professors who taught all the classes in smaller collegres. Many of the states lave recognized this and instead of supporting a large state institution, help to support the denominational colleges. Mr. J. C. Stewart in a clear and logical manner was the champion for the affirmative.
The negative and winning side made a strong defense for the state institutions It maintained that the denominational colleges were small and weak. That the majority of them fid not have sufficient funds to have the necessary ecpuipment essential for best work. That in many cases their doctrine was narrow and prejudiced. That in most cases it was necessary to employ weak and incompetent men in the faculty on the account of the scauty funds. It was argued that a man f.om a state institution had more behind him when he went out to serure a position. that the state institutions were rec ounized every where by everybody when that was not always the case with the deominational colleges
Mr. W. H. Fleming was the best speaker for the negative. J. S. Truitt.

Elon played the tirst of the two games scheduled with Atlanti" Christian College, of Wilson. N. C.. at Harden's park in Burlington. The game was fast an? in doubt from beginning to ent. Bun Hearne of the ist. Lonis Nationals, was in the box for A. (. C.. with "Tiny" Stuart, of Cireensboro, in the Carolina Association doing the receiling. These leaguers kept the boys of Elon guessing, nevertheless put up a stifl fight from begmming to end and died with three men on hases in the ninth. Malone for Elon pitched a steaty game. holding A. ('. C. Oo six scattered hits and calusing such batters as filen Sparrow, of the Apalachian Leagne. to pop up and hit easy gromoders to the intield. Ma lone himself thuch the hig leaguer up, for two clean susles. For Elon. Brown. Thompson an 1 Newman plaved excellent ball.
