program was well prepared and rendered with interest and enthusiasm. There were some excellent original papers on some of the live subjects of the day, some bubbling with wit and humor. A number of good orations were delivered, which showed that our boys are at work in earnest. Mr. R. A. Atkins won the laurels in oratory for the evening.

The debate was a heated discussion throughout. The debaters seemed to get into the spirit from the first and each one entered into the discussion with zeal and vim. The question was, "Resolved that denominational colleges offer better advantages than state institutions. The affirmative maintained that in the smaller colleges students came into more direct contact with the professor than in the larger state institutions, and not only did they get nearer the professor, but that there was a Letter social spirit among the students. It was also shown that in the larger institutions much of the work in the lower classes was done by the upper classmen who served as tutors and were not qualified to give as good instructions as the professors who taught all the classes in smaller colleges. Many of the states have recognized this and instead of supporting a large state institution, help to support the denominational colleges. Mr. J. C. Stewart in a clear and logical manner was the champion for the affirmative.,

The negative and winning side made a strong defense for the state institutions. It maintained that the denominational colleges were small and weak. That the majority of them did not have sufficient funds to have the necessary equipment essential for best work. That in many eases their doctrine was narrow and prejudiced. That in most cases it was necessary to employ weak and incompetent men in the faculty on the account of the seanty funds. It was argued that a man f.om a state institution had more behind him when he went out to secure a position, that the state institutions were recognized every where by everybody when that was not always the case with the denominational colleges.

Mr. W. H. Fleming was the best speaker for the negative. J. S. Truitt.

### THE GAME WITH A. C. C.

Elon played the first of the two games scheduled with Atlantic Christian College, of Wilson, N. C., at Harden's park in Burlington. The game was fast and in doubt from beginning to end. Bun Hearne, of the St. Louis Nationals, was in the box for A. C. C., with "Tiny" Stuart, of Greensboro, in the Carolina Association doing the receiving. These leaguers kept the boys of Elon guessing, nevertheless put up a stiff fight from beginning to end and died with three men on bases in the ninth. Malone for Elon pitched a steady game, holding A. C. C. to six scattered hits and eausing such batters as Glen Sparrow, of the Apalachian League, to pop up and hit easy grounders to the infield. Malone himself touch the big leaguer up for two clean singles. For Elon, Brown, Thompson and Newman played excellent ball.

The score by inning is as follows:

First: Thompson strikes out, so did Newman and Wright.

For A. C. C. Stuart fans the air at three of Malone's benders. Hackney gets an infield hit between second and short.

Sparrow sacrifices and Hackney is thrown out at second. Hearne gets a hit between second and first. Davis goes out by the strike feet route. No run and two hits. Second: Brown, McCauley and Ingle strike at three each of Hearne's fast hend-

For A. C. C. Lane grounds out, pitcher to first. Eure hits at three and sits down. Clarke hits an easy one to second and is thrown out at first.

Third: Woods gets safe on first by an error of the first baseman and takes second. Malone hits to short and is thrown out at first. Johnson fans and Thompson hits badly at three.

For A. C. C. Herndon hits to Wright, who misjudges it and lets it go over his bead. Stuart sacrifices and is thrown out head. Stuart sacrifices and is thrown out at first, Herndon going to second. Hackney gets a hit, scoring Herndon. Sparrow goes out third to first on a beautiful one hand stop and accurate throw of Newman. Hearn lifts an easy one to Brown in left. One run and one hit.

Fourth: Newman and Wright fan. Brown hits to third and is out at first. For A. C. C., Davis sends off with a hit. Lane hits to Wright, who drops the ball. Davis and Lane advancing to third and second on the error. Eure sacrifices to Woods, who throws Davis out at the plate. Clarke hits at three of Malone's speedy ones and Herndon goes out, pitcher to first. No runs and one hit.

Fifth: McCauley and Ingle fan. Woods hits to first and is out.

For A. C. C. Stuart hits an easy one to pitcher and is thrown out. Hackney gets to second on a long fly to Warren in right field, who had replaced Wright. Sparrow is safe at first on Wood's wild throw, pulling Ingle off the base. Hearne sacrifices. Thompson recovers the ball and fakes a throw to first, then turning and catching Hackney off third by a pretty throw. Davis flies out to Brown. No hits, and no runs.

Sixth: Malone leads off with a clean hit over short. Dickey, who had replaced Johnson, bunts and is safe on first with Malone on second. Thompson sacrifices and is out. Hearne to Clark, Malone and Dickey advancing to third and second. Newman sacrifices and Malone is caught at the plate. Warren, who had replaced Wright in right field, strikes out.

For A. C. C. Lane gets a hit. sacrifices and is safe, but forces Lane at second. Clark is safe on an error, both lase runners advancing a base. Herndon is thrown out at first. Dickey, Eure scorme. Stuart gets a hit, scoring Clark, Hackney is out, eatcher to first. Two hits and two runs.

Seventh: Brown goes out by the strike out route. McCauley hits to first and is out. Ingle safe on error. Woods fans.

For A. C. C., Sparrow walks. Hearn sacrifices and is out pitcher to first. Davis hits to left. Sparrow is out on a pretty throw from Brown to Thompson. Lane gets a pass. Eure fans. One run, no hits.

Eighth: Malone makes his second clean single. Dickey flies to center. Thompson strikes out. Malone is caught off first.

For A. C. C., Clark out. Dickey to first. Herndon out, eatcher to first. Stuart grounds out to Ingle at first.
