#### LENOIR IS BESTED.

##### Locals Win By Close Score.

Captain Warren and his outfit nosed out the bunch from Lenoir College today by a margin of 3-2. The game though slow was close and exciting. Elon's so-called unlucky seventh was turned into a fortunate period for this game as during this section of play, Malone's single together with Brown's drive to deep right for three bases and McCauley's clever base running put two across thus clinching the game for the locals.

Both pitchers were effective with men on bases, but at times Culbertson was wild, giving five passes and a hit batter. Malone was steady and when occasion demanded it put them over like an old head.

##### The game in detail:

1st—Lenoir—Rudisell gets one on his pistol pocket. Mackie safe on choice, which takes Rudisell at second. Poole fans and Lowe is an easy out to Horne.

Elon—Thompson hits safely over short. Newman sends one to left which Sox fumbles. McCauley out on strikes. Brown hits into a double play which takes Newman and himself.

2nd—Lenoir: Stuck flies to McCauley. Williams out, Neman to Ingle. Sox fans.

Elon—Warren works for transportation. Dickey and Ingle fail to connect. Horne safe on error at second, advancing Warren. Malone retires the side with a grounder which Poole fields cleanly.

3rd—Lenoir: Greene misses three, for the first time. Culbertson hits one for the first time. Rudisell hits to left advancing Culbertson to third. Rudisell caught off the bag at first. Malone shoots three past Mackie, but Thompson fails to hold the third one and Culbertson scores. Poole goes out, second to first.

Elon—Thompson walks. Newman gets hit. McCauley fans. Thompson goes to third. Brown again hits into a double play catching him and Newman as before.

Score: Elon, 0; Lenoir, 1.

4th—Lenoir: Lowe flies to McCauley. Stuck hits over second for one base but is caught off first by Thompson. Williams rolls an easy one to Ingle, who beats him to the bag.

Elon—Warren goes out, pitcher to first. Dickey gets four wide ones. Ingle tries to put him down but Culbertson throws to second, catching Dickey. Horne fans.

5th—Lenoir: Sox and Greene fail to

hit. Culbertson gets his second hit to left. Horne retires side by pulling down Rudisell's long fly after a brilliant sprint.

Elon—Malone flies to right field. Thompson hits safely to left field, but is caught napping at first. Newman fails to connect.

6th—Lenoir: Mackie out by Ingle. Poole likewise. Lowe gets on by Dickey's error, takes second and scores on Stuck's single to right field. Sox out on strikes.

Elon—McCauley gets a pass. Steals second on the first ball pitched. Brown sacrifices him to third. Warren safe on error at third. Dickey hits over short, scoring McCauley. Ingle fans and Horne goes out Rudisell to Williams.

Score—Lenoir, 2; Elon, 1.

7th—Lenoir. Sox thrown out by Warren. Greene lines to catcher. Culbertson gets a pass. Rudisell flies to Warren.

Elon—Malone gets a corking single over third. McCauley, running for him, steals second. Thompson strikes. Newman safe on error at third during which performance McCauley reaches the scene of disaster, and comes in with the run that tied it up. McCauley steps up to the plate, hits to second and is safe on choice which gets Newman at the plate. During this time McCauley is tenting on s cond, but scores on Brown's long hit to right for three bases.

Score—Lenoir, 2; Elon, 3.

8th—Lenoir: Mackie out, second to first. Poole safe on Malone's error. Lowe hits to Warren who catches Poole at second too late to double Lowe at first. Stuck out, pitcher to first.

Elon—Dickey flies to catcher on high foul. Ingle gets four, but loses the bag. Horne fans.

9th—Lenoir: Warren throws Williams out to Ingle. Sox flies to short, and Green ends the game with three strikes.
