MUSICALE.

A most enjoyable evening was spent on Saturday, May eleventh, at eight o'clock by all those who attended the musicale given by this year's certificate pupils of the music department of the college. Those receiving certificates this commencement, coming, are: Miss Ethel DuRant, Piano; Miss Maibelle Pritchette, Piano; Miss Allene Patton, Piano; and Mr. O. M. Barnes, Voice.

The program was interesting and well rendered from the opening number by Miss DuRant until the last notes of Miss Pritchette's final number had been struck. Numbers for the occasion, as can be seen from below, were drawn from the old school as well as the new and represent a variety of studies.

Miss DuRant made her best impression during her second appearance, with a waltz by Chopin and Glissando by Kneutzel. Miss Pritchette may lay the strength of her appeal to her last number, Polichinelle, "Carnaval Mignon," by Schutt.

Mr. Barnes was especially good in "Eventide," by Metcalf, and also gave Bizet's Toreador song from Carmen in a manner highly creditable to himself, while Miss Patton's success of the evening was easily "Last Hope," by Gottschalk. Her interpretation and rendition of this favorite selection were far above the ordinary.

EXPRESSION RECITAL.

Miss Marguerite Iseley, reader, assisted by Miss Frankie McNeil, pianist, gave a delightful program in the college chapel Tuesday evening, May fourteenth. The program represented a variety of studies and Miss Iseley's manner of presentation of the different numbers was all that could be wished for. Her enunciation was distinct, her voice, after the first number was clear and resonant, making herself easily understood in the farthest corners of the auditorium. Her gestures were easy and graceful, her stage deportment good, the general effect highly complimentary to herself and the department which she represented.

The scene from the Merchant of Venice illustrating the choice of caskets by Bassanio was given in a real Shakespearian manner and made the audience to rejoice with the successful chooser and feel glad for his reward. Close to this in point of impression made was, "The Daughter of Herodias," which was well-presented. "An Old Sweetheart of Mine" can well claim its share of honors while "Crossing the Bar," formed a fitting conclusion to the evening and was given in a manner highly impressive. We, too, with Tennyson, hope to meet our Pilot face to face, when we have crossed the bar.

The latter number, given by Miss McNeil represented her best endeavor for the evening. This added materially to the attractiveness of the program.

IMPROVEMENTS.

The Fire Escapes on the East Dormitory and Administration Building and the three-story porch to the West Dormitory have just been completed. The porch is on the north side of the young ladies' Dormitory and is 140 feet in length, 10 feet wide and three stories high, and is a magnificent addition not only to the architectural appearance of the building, but equally so to its serviceableness as a home.

These improvements cost the College \$1500 and to pay for them, at the request of the Executive Board of Trustees, the President engaged in a campaign of correspondence which concluded yesterday successfully.
