than thirty-three and one-third per cent in attendance over the attendance last year which was the best attendance at that time in the C'ollege's histury. The enroll ment today is two hundred and minetyfive, and not one hundred and forty-one nis some of the dispatches sent to the dred and forty-one which these papers have givell represents the number of Freshmen in the College this year.
