

CHARLES P. HEYWARD ADDRESSES THE HARDING-COOLIDGE CLUB.

Thursday evening the Harding-Coolidge Club had as their speaker Mr. Charles P. Heyward of Southern Pines, N. C., and Portland, Maine. The Republicans of the college including a large number of the co-eds, were out in a body to hear their speaker, and was frequently interrupted by applause.

Dr. W. A. Harper presented L. B. Ezell, president of the club, who introduced the speaker. Mr. Heyward asked a vote of his audience to ascertain their preference for "The whole story" or a discussion on the League of Nations and the dissipation of the Victory Loan. The audience responded with a unanimous vote for the longer speech.

Mr. Heyward's address dealt principally with the mistakes and shortcomings of the present administration. He was strong in his condemnation of the wasteful uses to which the Liberty Loans were put, and took a decided stand against the League of Nations.

The Republicans of the college have endeavored to secure a speaking engagement from Mrs. Mary Settle Sharpe, Republican candidate for State Superintendent of Public Instruction, but her time is completely taken up until election day.
