## INSPIRING TALK ON SOUTH AMERICA BY B. A. SHUMAN

Secretary Comes at Request of Y. M. C. A. Cabinet—Gives Details of Work

Mr. B. A. Shuman, General Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association in Buenos Aires, spoke to the students and faculty in the auditorium Tuesday morning.

Mr. Shuman spoke on "South America, the Country of Opportunity." The speaker brought to his auditors stories of the life of a "Y" worker in the great countries of South America. There were many interesting details of the working of the Association in Buenos Aires. Mr. Shuman stated that their building in that great city accommodated 2,500 men and that there was a membership of 4,000. There are five secretaries from the United States and twenty-five native secretaries carrying on this great work.

It was inspiring to hear the great message that Mr. Shuman delivered. He is an able man as indicated by the powerful influence he has had in spreading the gospel of the spirit, mind and body among the peoples of our neighboring continent.
