PLAYED IN VA.

Elon Scores in Second Quarter But Is Unable to Stave off 27 to 7 Defeat by Virginia Opponents.

WHITESELL PLAYS WELL

Dust and Heat Proves Handicaps to Both Teams. Many Substitutions Are Used for Both Sides.

The Hampden Sidney Tigers continued their offensive work by winning over the Elon College eleven Saturday afternoon by the score of 27 to 7. Heat and dust proved a handicap to both elevens, but after the first quarter the Tigers opened an offense that was continuous the remainder of the game.

The Tigers annexed thirteen first downs to Elon's three, and aggregated 313 yards on runs from scrimmage. Out of twelve attempted passes the Tigers completed seven. The Christians were unable to execute but one out of three. Elon tallied in the second quar ter after an error in generalship, which resulted in a Tiger punt from behind the goal line going outside on the two yard line. Elon rushed the ball through center for a goal and added the point after touchdown

Whitesell was the mainstay of the Elon line, but the inexperienced backfield behind resulted in little yardage for Elon. Captain Blankenship was the outstanding Tiger lineman, while Holladay continued his brilliant work in the back field, running one touchdown distance of forty-five yards. Richard-


