INTERCOLLEGIATE GLEE CLUB CONTEST

Amassing a total of 249 3-5 points out of a possible 300 the Yale Glee Club won the fourth annual intercollegiate contest held at Carnegie Hall, New York, March 7. Princeton came second with 223 2-5 points, and the University of Missouri third with 221 points. Fourteen college clubs participated.

Two microphones on the stage broadcasted the entire program. The hall was packed and standing room was sold out even before the singing started.

Should Yale win again next year she will have won for the third consecutive time and the Challenge Cup, now in the custody of the Yale Glee Club, will remain permanently in her possession.

At the conclusion of the evening all of the clubs assembled on the platform to unite in singing Gremer's "Prayer of Thanksgiving." Over five hundred voices joined in this song.

The colleges that competed in the contest were as follows: Amherst, Columbia, Dartmouth, Fordham, Harvard, Middlebury, New York University, University of Missouri, University of Wisconsin, Wesleyan, Princeton and Yale.

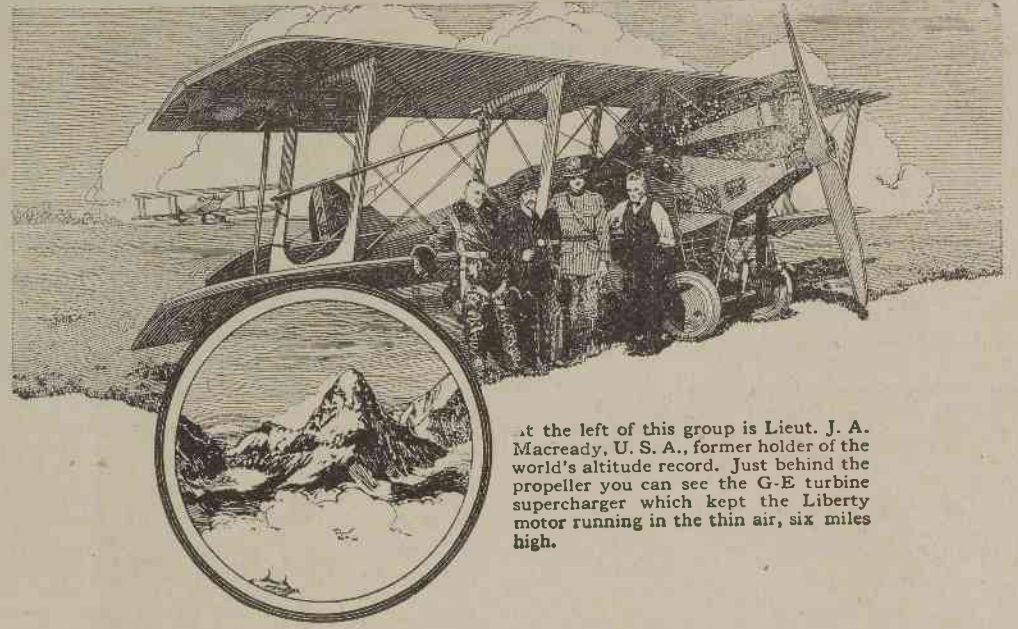
