MEETING OF THE SOUTHERN ASSOCIATION OF COLLEGES, AT FORT WORTH, TEXAS

Elon College sent as her representative to this meeting her Business Manager, who reports a good trip, a fine spirit, and excellent fellowship, as well as good programs in the meetings. It took over a week's time to make the trip and attend the meetings and the greater part of the time was spent on the train.

Elon was admitted to the Southern Association of Colleges two years ago at their meeting at Jackson, Mississippi. Her first report since entering was called for at this meeting and she is considered in good standing in the Association. After a college or university is admitted to this Association, the college must maintain certain scholastic and financial standards. The college must be able to show, at any time, that these standards are being met and that the college is doing faithful, honest work.

At this meeting three colleges were admitted from North Carolina and one from Tennessee. Our sister colleges admitted are the State College of Agriculture and Engineering at Raleigh, N. C.; Catawba College at Salisbury, N. C.; and Lenoir-Rhyne College at Hickory, N. C. We congratulate these sister institutions on their admission to this great association. It is rather singular that, of the eighteen four-year colleges that applied for membership, only four were admitted and three of these were North Carolina colleges. This fact would indicate that the North Carolina colleges are coming to the front more rapidly, perhaps, than the colleges of other states.

The Southern Association of Colleges is the great accrediting agency for colleges in the South. It is one of the strongest and strictest of the accrediting college agencies in this country and the college admitted to this association is quite fortunate indeed, and students and faculty alike, as well as the alumni of Elon College, take great pride in the fact that Elon College is accredited by this association, and we are expecting all friends of Elon College to rally to the financial support of the college that she may continue to remain a member institution of this great organization.
